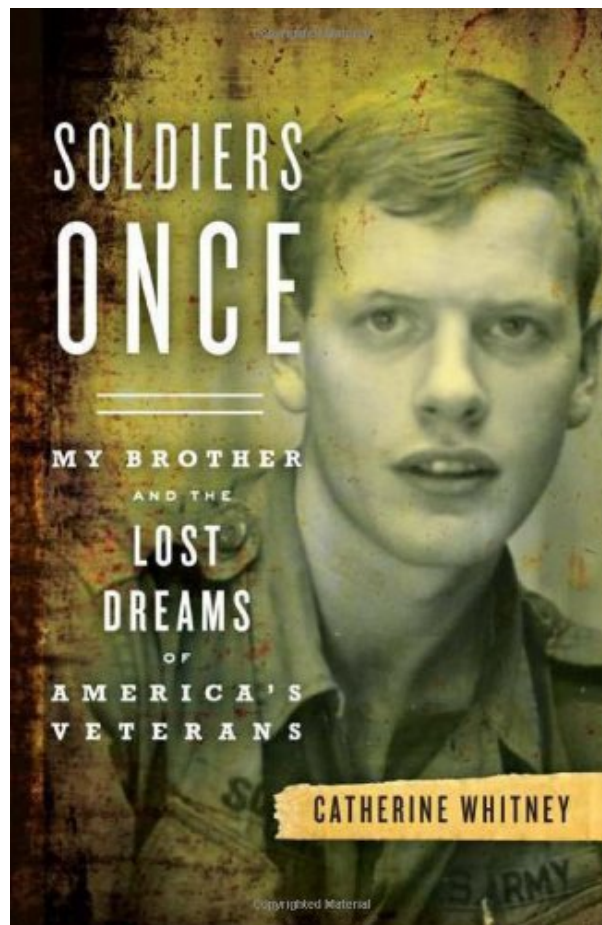
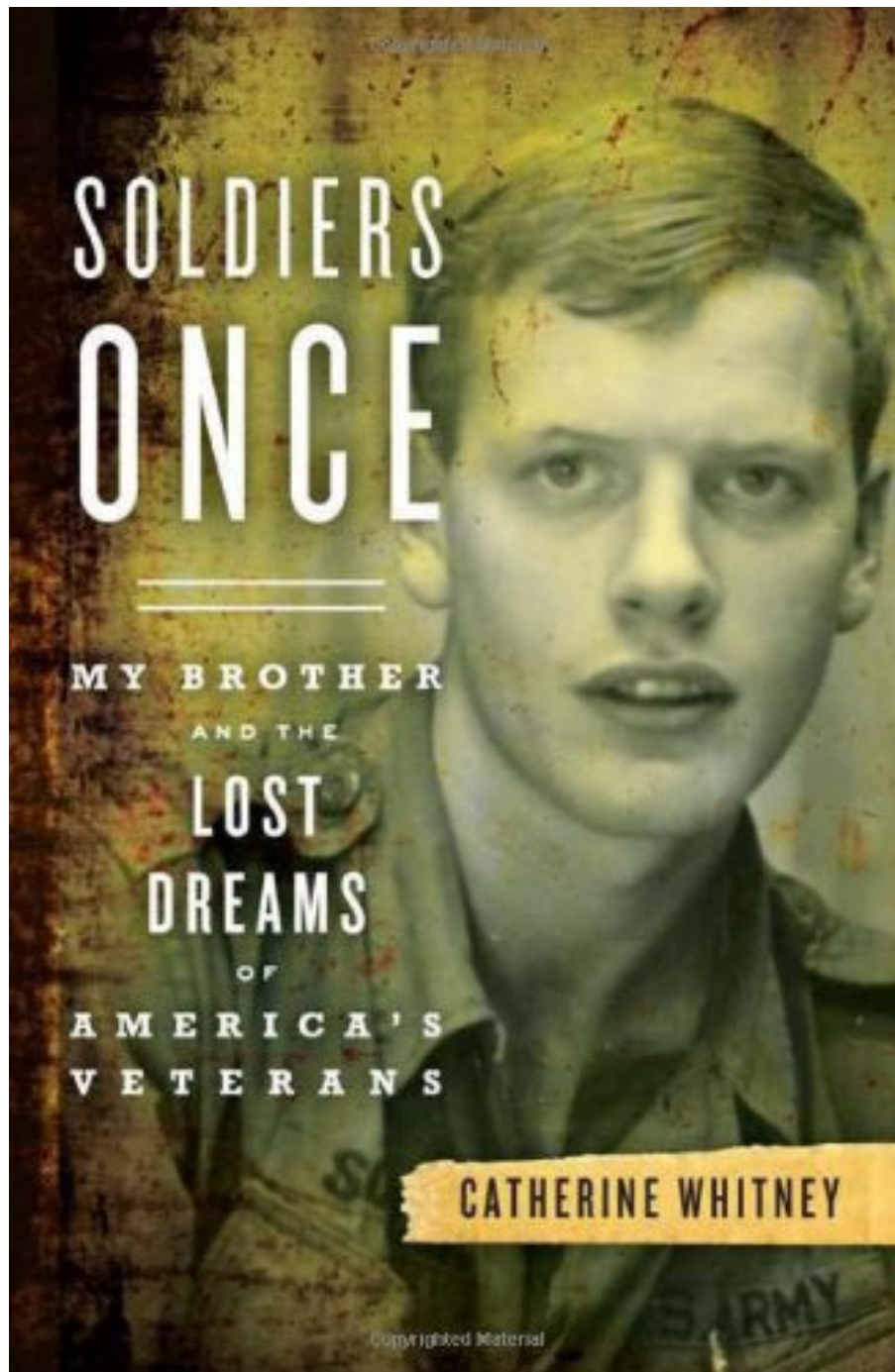

In her book, "Soldiers Once", she uses her experiences and the emotional issues she had from her brother's life and death, as a vehicle for giving us a larger understanding of veterans. She may have been motivated in the beginning, to search and gain a better understanding of her brother's war experiences and why he was like he was when he came back home. However, in the end, she discovers a much greater voice for others and opens the door for many like herself.
